





OUR MISSION

My Sister's Place (MSP) shelters, supports and empowers survivors of domestic violence and their children, while providing leadership and education to build a supportive community.



Grounded by the experiences and needs of the survivors we serve, My Sister's Place provides:

Safe Housing:

Emergency shelter and transitional-to-permanent housing through rental payments for up to two years.

Personalized Support:

Trauma-informed and survivor-centered 1:1 case management, cash assistance, workforce development, and financial literacy programs to build self-sufficiency.

Alumni Care:

Ongoing support through referrals and peer groups to ensure long-term stability and independence.

Our Vision:

Our vision is that every survivor who enters our doors is greeted with immediate, personalized, compassionate care and the resources needed for healing and achieving independence.

"MSP has been the only help—my village—that that I have had. I never thought this support was possible.

From a very young age, I never had the support I needed in every aspect of my life, including my childhood. I didn't realize how much help I needed until it was provided by MSP. Through MSP I have completed parenting classes and therapy, and just really take care of myself.

Forging Our Path, Then and Now

A Letter from the
Executive Director,
Mercedes Lemp



Forty-five years ago, a group of determined women came together, unaware that they were laying the foundation for a future where safety, autonomy, and hope would become a reality for thousands of survivors.

Valle Jones, one of My Sister's Place's founders, recently shared with me her reflections on the early days of the organization. She recalled that the founders didn't see themselves as counselors or social workers—**they called themselves advocates:**

"Our job, if nothing else, was to say, 'We trust you, we trust your judgment, and we are here to help you do what you have identified in this moment is best for you; and if it changes tomorrow, or in a week, or in a year, we'll be here to help you do what you have decided is best for you in this next moment."

Valle's beliefs remain at the heart of my vision for My Sister's Place today: **meeting women where they are and supporting them through their toughest moments.** Honoring the founder's original mission, our commitment goes beyond supporting survivors in moments of crisis—**we seek to restore independence without constraints.**

Too often, financial barriers trap survivors in unsafe situations, exacerbating both ongoing physical abuse and financial hardship. **In 2024, with the help of funders and our community, we took significant action to address barriers like financial insecurity and unemployment** by launching individualized and person-centered initiatives aimed at directly building economic stability for survivors and their families.

- Our **NEW Workforce Development Program** provides survivors with targeted job training, as well as certification and degree programs, to assist them in securing meaningful employment.
- Our **guaranteed income program, RISE Trust**, is unparalleled in delivering monthly unrestricted direct cash disbursements to survivors. Select families in our transitional housing program receive \$500 each month for up to two years, along with financial education.

With your support, we're not just addressing immediate safety needs—**we're creating long-term solutions for sustainable independence. Our vision for the next five years is to expand and institutionalize our cash assistance, financial education, and workforce development programs** so that all survivors at MSP have the tools they need to achieve self-sufficiency. With your help, MSP will continue to passionately advocate for survivors and empower families to realize secure and fulfilling lives for years to come.




Client Success Spotlight Mara's Story

Mara and her children became homeless during the COVID Pandemic due to domestic violence, and entered MSP's care in May 2023. Her MSP advocate connected her to community resources related to employment, education, income, and access to childcare. With the assistance and support of MSP, Mara set goals for obtaining employment and participated in an 8-month Police Academy program through a local community college. She graduated in October and was hired as a police officer with a local police department. Best of all, Mara and her children recently transitioned into an apartment of their own where they now live safely and independently.

Workforce Development

Removing Obstacles for New Beginnings

We proudly launched our **Workforce Development Program (WFD) in 2024**, which provides holistic support to survivors with skill building, career guidance, and job placement support, in collaboration with local employers and job training providers.

Success Stories

Paid Internship Success

A client secured a paid internship with an information technology consulting firm after completing an MSP-sponsored COMPTIA+ certification course identified by our workforce development specialist.

Vocational Achievements

One client completed special police officer training and licensing, securing employment with a security services company.

Three clients passed their dental assistant certification exams, with two already receiving job offers from local dental practices.

Breaking Barriers to Employment

A client struggling to find employment was hired by the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority (WMATA), beginning her training in December.

Through these initiatives, MSP is bridging the gap between survivors and sustainable employment, continuously advocating for them to achieve independence and stability.

RISE Trust

Building Foundations of Stability

The RISE Trust program is a first-of-its-kind universal basic income (UBI) initiative designed for domestic violence survivors. Families in MSP's transitional housing programs receive \$500 each month, along with financial education, for two years. This program aims to disrupt the cycle of abuse and address systemic economic barriers.

Because **99% of domestic violence survivors report experiencing financial abuse**, supporting financial independence is a major factor in allowing survivors to leave, and stay away from, violent relationships.

MSP's first cohort of families graduated from RISE Trust in 2024, with the second cohort beginning in 2025. The Urban Institute partnered with MSP to measure the impact of the first RISE Trust program cohort. Their findings reveal the life-changing impact for survivors:

"Thanks to MSP and the RISE Trust program, I've been able to provide a healthier environment for my child and work toward a better future. The \$500 may not seem like a lot to some, but to me, it has been life-changing. I'm becoming a better mom, and I'm grateful for the support that has helped me grow personally and professionally."

A MILESTONE CELEBRATION

MSP's 45th Anniversary Event

The energy in the room was palpable as over **200 community members**, supporters, staff and clients gathered for a shared purpose: celebrating 45 years of My Sister's Place's unwavering service to survivors of domestic violence. Hosted at the historic Decatur House, near the White House, this extraordinary evening recognized the organization's profound legacy and the united commitment of dedicated supporters and staff to our mission.

The presence of the original founders, who envisioned a better world in 1976, evoked a powerful sense of reflection. In an era of change, these determined women transformed their call for justice into a lifeline for survivors, and their legacy continues today.

Our keynote speaker, Cynthia Smith, is a part of this legacy. With great resonance, she began to tell her story—one that is too familiar to many survivors. She spoke of her heart-wrenching experience that involved escaping her abuser, who was never held accountable, to facing a system that continuously failed her. She lost custody of her children and was not able to access her marital assets.



Yet, she continued,

"When I found myself trapped in a cycle of abuse, feeling helpless and alone, it was My Sister's Place that offered refuge and safety when I needed it most. My Sister's Place provided me with dignified housing in their RISE Plus program, cash assistance through the Fresh Start Fund, furniture through their Move In Program, and supportive services like Art Therapy."

Tonight, I stand before you in celebration of survival, able to speak my truth as someone who has faced one of life's most harrowing challenges and has emerged as more than just a survivor."

We extend our immense appreciation to Cynthia for her passionate dedication to survivors and her tireless advocacy. We are also profoundly grateful to our community of supporters—**together we raised an inspiring \$157,840 for the families we serve.** This generosity is a reflection of our community's collective strength and the belief that survivors deserve a safe path toward renewed independence.

REVIVING LEGACY INITIATIVES

Honoring the Past, *Building the Future*

The Clothesline Project

The Clothesline Project, a historical initiative, was revitalized this year at MSP. The day honored the original national Clothesline Project art installation that draws awareness to domestic abuse and highlights the connections that bind us.

“Doing the laundry has always been considered women’s work, and in the days of close-knit neighborhoods, women often exchanged information over backyard fences while hanging their clothes out to dry.”

MSP displays t-shirts created by survivors, on clotheslines bearing the weight of so many stories. Passersby are invited to view the shirts and create messages of their own for the clotheslines. The Clothesline Project continues to reclaim survivors' stories amongst the community, and serves as a formidable reminder that survivors, advocates, loved ones, will not be silenced.



Domestic Violence Awareness Month (DVAM)

MSP significantly increased outreach efforts during DVAM, engaging **over 900 individuals across 17 events to raise awareness**, share resources, and strengthen community partnerships. MSP conducted seven training and speaking engagements, including sessions with corporate partners such as Dataminr, Accenture, and the Zonta Club, and participated in panels hosted by American University, NVRDC, and the Department of Child Support Services.

DVAM Highlights included:

- Speaking at Alpha Chi Omega's Sexual Assault Panel for American University fraternities and sororities.
- Presenting to the Department of Health & Human Services' Homeless Youth Division to share critical insights on our programming.
- Tabling at 10 events, including United Way's Project Community Connect and the Metropolitan Police Department's remembrance gathering.



VOLUNTEER & COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS

Volunteer Impact

Each year, MSP relies on scores of volunteers to provide services, trainings, donations, events, and more. Nearly **100 volunteers** positively impacted MSP this year.

Most of the clients who enter our emergency shelters are fleeing with just the clothes on their backs and a suitcase. Therefore, we rely heavily on community support to make sure our clients' immediate needs are met. **In FY24, 50 individuals, groups, and partner organizations** came together to fulfill MSP's requests for coats, school supplies, toiletries, diapers, wipes, toys, and so much more.



Volunteer Spotlight

The National Children's Museum, Washington Nationals Baseball Team, and Circus Vazquez collectively provided over 400 tickets to families for events across the city.

Amerigroup's Backpack Drive: Amerigroup generously gifted \$30,000 dollars for employment training, education, and workforce development needs. They also hosted a backpack drive and volunteered their time to stuff backpacks with school supplies for every child in our emergency shelters.

The Lipstick Project: In collaboration with GW Hospital and Evans Consulting, lipstick tubes containing discrete safety plans for survivors were dispersed into the community. Adrienne, who answered the call for more volunteer support on this project, helped us fill empty lipstick containers with safety plans for those who may be experiencing domestic violence, she shared,

"Supporting MSP gives us an opportunity to let survivors know there is a community that cares. My daughter and I are honored to partner with MSP and uphold their mission."



Adrienne and her daughter also organized volunteers to fulfill the entire wishlist for our children's playroom.

In Our Community, We Thrive: Coming Together in Collaboration



We are honored and privileged for the inspiring community support we received through new and historical collaboration in 2024.

Here are some highlights:

Alpha Chi Omega

Students rally for MSP through American University's Alpha Chi Omega Chapter: A longstanding community partner, AXO collectively raises over \$10,000 each year for MSP through their engagement events. The Walk a Mile in Their Shoes event takes place each March at American University, attracting a large gathering of students to raise funds and awareness for MSP.

Community Partners Presenting Life Skills Workshops

Life skills workshops for survivors occur monthly at MSP. Partner organizations including Ayuda, the DC Volunteer Lawyers Project, and the Office of the Tenant Advocate have presented on topics of particular interest to survivors, including protection orders, family law, immigration law, and tenants' rights.

DC Volunteers Lawyers Project

MSP Teams Up for Weekly Resource Clinics with DC Volunteer Lawyers Project (DCVLP) at Mt. Pleasant Library. Longtime MSP partner DCVLP hosts a weekly resource clinic to assist survivors of domestic violence and immigrants in accessing legal support. MSP staff tables alongside DCVLP to make sure survivors are aware of the many resources available to them.

Partners Offer Workforce Development Opportunities

Our Workforce Development Program actively partners with employers and job training and education organizations to provide opportunities for survivors in our programs. Current partnerships include Hope Project, the Latin American Youth Career Academy, Hands on Dental Assistant Training, Department of Employment Services-American Job Center, and Archangel DC.

Professional Development

MSP also provided professional development resources and funding for staff to grow:

- Personalized coaching to support employees with career growth, goal setting, professional development, overcoming workplace challenges, and enhancing interpersonal skills.
- \$2,000 allocated to each employee for professional development. Staff used funding for higher education, conferences, workshops, counseling licensure, memberships, and professional fellowships.


